In the mid seventeenth century, the Delaware River was named after Sir Thomas West (Lord de la Warr), an English nobleman and the Virginia colony's first governor. The Delaware River's main stem begins near Hancock, NY and continues south to the Atlantic Ocean between Cape May, NJ and Cape Henlopen, DE.

The Delaware River's history is a success story of how a river that was



"once of the most polluted rivers in the world" became a thriving ecosystem. By the 1950's the river's water below Trenton was so polluted it would peel and discolor the paint on WWII ships. Oxygen depletion prevented fish migration that had occurred for thousands of years prior. Government regulations, non-profit organizations and grassroots involvement were instrumental in reviving the river. Shad, striped bass and sturgeon can once again travel their ancestral routes while bald eagles hunt for them overhead. Monitoring and improvement of water quality.is on-going.

The Delaware River, along with 7 of its tributaries, has been designated as part of the National Wild and Scenic River program by the National Park Service. This honor has been given to fewer than 1/4 of 1% of all the rivers in the United States and provides additional protection to the river ecosystem.
